are serious—most of the time! Toss in some picture puzzles and logic tricks, and you have the world's most original mix of


children will pick up some fascinating facts, st-re-t-ch their minds, and learn to think creatively—just like Dr. Seuss!

... said that he had a hard time finding someone who would pay any attention to his first children's book. Happily, that never happened again... That book and the forty-three others he wrote and illustrated have all become modern classics.

The most famous of them all may be *The Cat in the Hat.* This extraordinary story was so revolutionary in its impact that it created a new kind of publishing for children: Beginner Books, books that children could read (and delight in) all by themselves. In 1957, Theodor Geisel, known to the world as Dr. Seuss, wrote a book called *The Cat in the Hat.* It was fun to read aloud, easy to read

It was fun to read aloud, easy to read alone, and impossible to put down. From this magically right beginning came the concept of Beginner Books, exacting blends of words and pictures that encourage children to read—all by themselves. Hailed by elementary edu-cators and remedial reading specialists, these enormously popular books are now used in schools and libraries throughout the Enclish-speaking world. the English-speaking world.
